

Education has always been close to his heart. As a legislator, he has authored more than 300 laws, many of which have advanced the educational system in the Philippines. These include free kindergarten, free college education, the Anti-Bullying Act, the Ladderized Education Act, the Student Fare Discount Act, the Second Congressional Commission on Education, and many others.

He completed his studies at Xavier School, the London School of Economics, the University of the Philippines College of Law, and Harvard Law School.

In July 2024, he was appointed by President Ferdinand "Bongbong" R. Marcos Jr. to lead the Department of Education.



## Hon. Jose Francisco "Kiko" B. Benitez, PhD Director-General. Technical Education and Skills Development Authority

Sec. Kiko Benitez is the Director General of the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA).

He served as Representative of the Third District of Negros Occidental in 2019-2024 and was a member of the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM II). In the House, he held several key roles, leading policy discussions on a wide range of issues, from education reform to digital transformation, from circular economy to supply chain resilience, from housing finance and sustainable urbanization to creative industries and blue economy.

He is a principal author of landmark laws, including Republic Act No. 11648, which increases the age to determine statutory rape; RA No. 11899, which created EDCOM II; RA No. 11904, which aims to strengthen creative industries; RA No. 11995, which institutionalizes environmental-economic accounting in the country, and RA No. 12000, which created the Negros Island Region.

Secretary Benitez has been a strong voice calling for paradigm shifts in education governance and development planning, stressing the need for systems thinking, design solutions, and innovation to ensure equity and sustainability, and address the demands of the Fourth Industrial Revolution.

### DR. ADRIAN KUAH

Director, Futures Office National University of Singapore

### Education Policy and Futures Thinking: Emerging Trends and Opportunities for Philippine Education

Dr Adrian WJ Kuah is the founding director of the Futures Office, National University of Singapore, an internal futures think-tank tasked to ask fundamental questions and to uncover and challenge hidden assumptions in order to reimagine the future of the university.

Prior to his current appointment, from 2015 to 2018, he was Senior Research Fellow and Head, Case Studies Unit at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. His research interests included futures thinking, education and public policy, and complexity science.

Adrian started his career in the civil service first as a foreign service officer with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and then as an economist in the Monetary Authority of Singapore.

He subsequently left for the private sector as a business strategy consultant before embarking on an academic career with the S Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Nanyang Technological University. As Assistant Professor on its Military Studies programme, he taught on the MSc programmes as well as the Goh Keng Swee Command and Staff College's professional military education courses

He returned to the civil service for a second stint in 2013 as Lead Strategist in the Centre for Strategic Futures, Strategic Policy Office, Prime Minister's Office, where he was involved in whole-of-Government futures research and scenario planning. He led a team in analysing complex, crosscutting public policy issues across the social, economic, infrastructure and security domains. He also conducted training on futures thinking and complexity science for the Singapore Public Service at the Civil Service College.

On the strategic foresight and scenario planning front, Adrian has conducted numerous training workshops for students at the Lee Kuan Yew School, as well as for civil servants from a variety of government agencies. Such agencies include the Ministry of Defence, Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education, and the Monetary Authority of Singapore, among others. Externally, Adrian has also conducted training on scenario planning for the governments of Oman, UAE, Saudi Arabia, Thailand, Kazakhstan, as well as the Australia and NewZealand School of Government (ANZSOG). In June 2018, he was asked by the President of NUS to conceptualise and set up the NUS Futures Office. Adrian obtained his Bachelor of Arts (Honours) degree in Economics and Politics from the University of York, graduating with first class honours, followed by his Master of Arts degree in International Politics from the

University of Warwick. He earned his Doctor of Philosophy degree in Defence Policy and Economics from Cranfield University on a fully-funded scholarship.





Ronald U. Mendoza, PhD is Undersecretary for Strategic Management (Policy, Planning and Public-Private Partnerships) with the Department of Education of the Republic of the Philippines. He is a governance and institutional reforms specialist with over 25 years of experience in economic development policy and public administration reforms.

He served as Dean and Professor of Economics with the Ateneo School of Government, from 2016 to 2022. Between August 2020 and July 2022 he also served as Chief of Party of PARTICIPATE, a three year USAID project focused on supporting citizens' participation in governance and strengthening democratic and governance institutions. Throughout 2022 and 2023, he served as Regional Director for Southeast Asia at IDInsight, a global advisory, data analytics, and research organization seeking to improve lives with the use of data and evidence.

From 2011 to 2015, he was an Associate Professor of Economics at the Asian Institute of Management (AIM), and the Executive Director of the AIM Rizalino S. Navarro Policy Center for Competitiveness. His research background includes work with UNICEF, UNDP, the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU), and several Manila-based non-governmental organizations. In early 2021, the United Nations Economic and Social Council (UN ECOSOC) approved Ron Mendoza's appointment to serve with the 24-person UN Committee of the Experts on Public Administration (CEPA 2021-2025). And from 2022 to 2024, he was listed among the Philippines' top 100 scientists in the AD Scientific Index based on the total number of citations in the last 5 years.

Ron Mendoza obtained his Bachelor's Degree in Economics (Honors Program) from the Ateneo de Manila University in the Philippines, his Masters in Public Administration and International Development (MPA-ID) from the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, and his M.A. and Ph.D. in Economics from Fordham University.



Fr. Karel S. San Juan SJ brings to the Presidency of Ateneo de Davao University his rich background in academics, Jesuit vocation, service, and university leadership.

His academic journey includes earning a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics, graduating cum laude and valedictorian from Ateneo de Manila University in 1986, and a Bachelor in Sacred Theology, graduating summa cum laude from Loyola School of Theology, Ateneo de Manila University in March 2010. In 1993, he took his Master in Development Management at the Asian Institute of Management in Makati City, graduating with distinction. Later, as a Jesuit, in May 2007, he received a Doctorate in Leadership Studies from Gonzaga University in Spokane, Washington, USA.

His professional journey started right after the 1986 EDSA revolution when he joined social development offices at the Ateneo de Manila University. After earning his graduate degrees, he moved toward consultancy and facilitation roles, particularly in strategic planning, development management, and organizational development, for various Philippine government agencies, local and international NGOs, schools, and Church organizations. He taught at the Ateneo de Manila University and the Asian Institute of Management. He co-designed the PhD in Leadership Studies program of Ateneo de Manila University. He has given several talks and seminars and published articles on leadership, spirituality, and organizational development.

Fr. San Juan served as the President of Ateneo de Zamboanga University from October 2013 to March 2023. Through these years, he navigated several challenges, including the Zamboanga siege, terrorist threats, the K-12 transition, and the COVID-19 pandemic. The university reinforced its leadership in the region in academic excellence, social development, and integral formation. In September 2023, he assumed the role as President of Ateneo de Davao University

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Dr. Tirso A. Ronquillo, President of Batangas State University, The National Engineering University, exemplifies the university dictum: "Leading Innovations, Transforming Lives, Building the Nation."

His presidency, which began in 2014, accelerated the pace of re-engineering the University's intellectual capital, human resources, academic, and research infrastructures, and strengthened its local and global presence in the academic community. He established the BatStateU Knowledge, Innovation, and Science Technology (KIST) Park, the first in the country, and is designated as a Special Economic Zone by virtue of Presidential Proclamation No. 947 on May 22, 2020. In pursuit of research and innovation, he established the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Environmental Research (STEER) Hub, Center for Technopreneurship and Innovation (CTI) as well as a number of research centers aimed at producing research-driven products responsive to the socio-economic development of the country. Through Dr. Ronquillo's aggressive push for programs on Innovations, Batangas State University has advanced to 111th place in the 2025 World University Rankings for Innovation (WURI), positioning itself among the top 400 innovative universities globally, solidifying its role as a leader in innovation.

Since 2017, Dr. Ronquillo serves as the President of the Philippine Association of State Colleges and Universities (PASUC). He championed the value and strength of SUCS in promoting the welfare of faculty and employees. On innovation and change, Dr. Ronquillo introduced the Platform for Innovating SUCs for Industry 4.0 (PISI), whose vision is to power up the intellectual capital of state universities and colleges. In recognition of his exemplary leadership in increasing the research productivity of the University, he was hailed as the 2022 Outstanding Science Administrator by the Department of Science and Technology (DOST), through the National Academy of Science and Technology, Philippines (NAST PHL).



Dr. Vicente K. Fabella is the President of Jose Rizal University, where he also serves as the Vice Chairman and President. His distinguished academic background includes a Ph.D. in Business Administration from the University of the Philippines, an MBA with a concentration in Finance & Management from Columbia Business School, and a Master in Public Administration with a concentration in Policy Analysis from the Columbia School of International and Public Affairs, both in New York. He completed his undergraduate studies with an A.B. in Economics and Development Studies from Brown University, Rhode Island.

A highly active leader in the Philippine educational landscape, Dr. Fabella holds significant roles in various professional and civic organizations. He is the Current President of the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) and serves as a Committee Member for the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM2), focusing on Governance & Finance. His commitment to educational development is further demonstrated by his membership osn the Board of Advisors for Philippine Business in Education, the Board of Trustees for the Private Education Retirement Annuity Association (PERAA), and the Board of Trustees for St. Paul University Manila.Dr. Fabella's influence extends internationally as a Member of the Board for the Academy on International Business (Southeast Asia Region) and a Member of the Association of Southeast Asian Institutions of Higher Learning (ASAIHL). He has been a pivotal figure in shaping national education policy, having served as a former President for two terms of the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU), former Chairman of the Coordinating Council of the Philippine Educational Associations, and former President of the Philippine Association of Colleges and Schools of Business.

His exemplary service was recognized in 2022 when he was honored with the Ulirang Mandaleño Award for Education.



Dr. Karol Mark Yee is the Executive Director of the Second Congressional Commission on Education, which is tasked to assess the Philippine education system and provide policy recommendations for reform. He completed his PhD at the University of Cambridge as a scholar of the Jardine Foundation and the Cambridge Trust. He is concurrently a faculty member at the Ateneo de Manila University, a Research Fellow at the University of the Philippines Centre for Integrative and Development Studies (UP CIDS), and a Research Affiliate at the Program for Research on Private Higher Education (PROPHE) at the State University of New York (SUNY) in Albany.

He previously served as Executive Director IV of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and as Director of its K to 12 Transition Program. He also worked as Legislative Officer in the Philippine Senate under then Senator Edgardo J. Angara, who chaired the Committee on Education in the 19th Congress. In addition, he was Chief of Party of YouthWorks PH, a five-year youth empowerment and workforce development project implemented by the Philippine Business for Education (PBED) in partnership with USAID.

Dr. Yee completed his Master of Education (Ed.M.) in International Education Policy at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education (HGSE) as a Fulbright Scholar. He earned his Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in Broadcast Communication at the University of the Philippines Diliman, graduating Magna Cum Laude and receiving the Gawad Tsanselor.

He has served as President of various professional organizations, including the Philippine Economic Society and the Asian Society of Agricultural Economists, and on advisory boards and councils across Asia and the Pacific. Currently, he co-chairs, with Canada, the OECD Southeast Asia Regional Programme.

Outside government, he has served as a consultant and advisor to major development agencies and multilateral bodies, including the World Bank, Asian Development Bank, OECD, ASEAN, and several United Nations agencies.

In recognition of his service and contributions to economics and public policy, he has received numerous honors, including the lifelong title of Academician from the National Academy of Science and Technology, the Most Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of the Philippines Alumni Association, and distinguished alumni awards from the East-West Center and the University of Hawaii. He is also a lifelong honorary member of the Asian Society of Agricultural Economists.

DDG Rosanna A. Urdaneta is a distinguished leader recognized for advancing the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) sector both nationally and internationally. In more than half a century, Bayanihan has covered 14 major world tours, more than 100 short tours in six continents and in more than 700 cities worldwide.

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
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
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
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
